Fund Hits Goal

Even after an extra week the outcome of the 1974 Plymouth Community Fund Drive was in doubt, but seven minutes before the results were to be announced at a luncheon Thursday, drive chairman Don Fleming totaled up the final collections and discovered that the drive had made it.

The goal for 1974 was \$220,000 - the fund drive collected \$220,000.

"We have reached our goal," a jubilant Fleming told the division chairmen and fund directors. "It was the hourly rate worker, the guy on the bench, who made the difference."

According to final returns, only the industrial division exceeded its goal — in this case by a margin big enough to put the entire drive over the top.

Dick Anderson of Associated Spring, chairman of the industrial division, reported that his team — Gil Forthofer, Bill Carlson, Jim Boyce, John Walenski, Bob Johnson, Dave McGloughlin, Mark Penner and John Lynch — raised \$183,500 against a goal of \$163,000.

"That was an exceptional job in very difficult times," Fleming said.

School administrator Jim Leary, chairman of the educational division, reported collections of \$6,738 against a goal of \$12,000, but noted that 100 percent of one group of school employees (cafeteria personnel)

contributed to the fund.

Residential chairman Charlotte Petro collected \$6,358 on a goal of \$7,500. Business chairman Chuck Heidt reported that his division collected \$14,200 against a goal of \$21,000. Professional division chairman Janet Brass raised \$3,495 toward a goal of \$9,000 and governmental chairman Jim Grater reported that government employees contributed \$2,200 against a goal of \$3,000.

Special gifts chairman Scott Dodge collected contributions of \$3,465 toward a goal of \$4,500.

Fleming, whose Western Electric Co. hosted the Thursday luncheon, was awarded the community fund's "Go-Go Bird" for his efforts as chairman of the drive.

"He's a real driver," said Helen Richardson, chairman of the fund's boards of directors. "Each and every person has given generously. I feel very humble. We were leery of victory — up until the last minute we had not arrived."

Ann Arbor Road, Haggerty, Joy to Open

Ann Arbor Road between Main Street and Lilley Road should be open for traffic Monday, according to a spokesman for the state highway department.

The reopening is one of several improvements expected to make driving easier in the next few weeks for Plymouth-Canton motorists.

Joy Road, which has been closed for several months at the 1-275, overpass, during

reconstruction of a collapsed sanitary sewer, should re-open about Dec. 15, county road commission officials report.

Paving of a stretch of Haggerty Road between Hines Drive and Ann Arbor Trail is just about complete and that road should be open this week.

State highway officials are shooting for an early January opening of a five-mile segment of the I-275 expressway between Schoolcraft and Ford Road.

reporter from the Community Crier visited the Gottschalk turkey farm on North Territorial Road in Plymouth Township to see what the turkeys there were up to before Thanksgiving.

Our reporter was lucky enough to interview one Thomas Turkey, the 39-pound spokesman for the large flock that resides at the farm.

Reporter: How does it feel to be the largest turkey on the farm?

Tom: Well, it has its advantages. Most people don't want a turkey as big as me on the table, so I don't have to give myself for the "cause" as soon as some of the rest.

Reporter: The "cause"? What exactly is that?

Tom: Well, you know, all of us turkeys are really martyrs for a good cause — to keep people full and happy on Thanksgiving Day. 'Course, some of us — the 12 to 15 pounders — go sooner than us bigger fellas.

Reporter: How long have you lived on the farm?

Tom: About half of us came here in May, the rest in June; but a good two-thirds of us will be leaving the farm for Thanksgiving, and the rest will be gone for Christmas.

Reporter: Do you receive good care out here?

Tom: Oh my, yes. We're fed regularly and have a nice big yard to run in. Lloyd Sharland, the boss, has had lot of experience at this — 30 years, no

Tom: No. Sharland is Gottschalk's son-in-law and they worked the turkey business together before Gottschalk passed away.

Reporter: How did the business get started?

Tom: You know, that's an interesting story. My great-grandfather 28 times removed was won in a keno game by Gottschalk, who also bought some Henriettas — you folks call them hens — and a couple more Toms to keep Grandpa Turkey company. Before he knew it, he had a flourishing business going! There



Despite miserable weather, a large gathering attended swearing-in ceremonies and a reception Wednesday night for Canton's new township officials.

The function was held in the UAW Hall on Michigan Avenue with township dignitaries, friends and families of the newly-elected officials on hand.

Supervisor Robert Greenstein was sworn in, along with Treasurer Carl Parsell, Clerk John Flodin and Trustees Gerald Cheske (two-year term), Robert Myers and Brian Schwall (four-year terms).

Greenstein was presented with a gavel and wood block by members of the Canton Democratic Club.

Townships, City To Get Job Funds

New federal funds may soon enable the City of Plymouth, Plymouth Township and Canton to add unemployed residents to their public payrolls.

The grants are supplemental funding under the federal Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA). All three units of government received initial grants from the act last summer.

Under a formula created by the Wayne County Board of Commissioners, Plymouth Township has been allocated \$40,943, the largest share among local communities; the City of Plymouth will get \$31,257 and Canton Township \$25,497.

Because the money need not be spent for two years, some of the governments have yet to decide exactly what they'll do with it.

Plymouth Township hired a full-time clerk in the treasurer's office with last summer's grant and tentatively plans to put four residents to work this spring on the township recreation site and the newly-purchased Hilltop Golf Course.

Plymouth City Manager Fred L. Yockey hopes that the additional funds will enable the city to hire its first ordinance officer, an official charged with enforcing city ordinances, issuing dog licenses and checking parking meters.

The city alréady plans to add a full-time employee in the department of public works, a full-time maintenance worker at the cultural center and an additional clerk in the department of parks and recreation.

Yockey noted that while the jobs are only temporary, the new employees might have an opportunity to stay with the city if permanent funding were found for their jobs.

"These are jobs to employ people," he said, "but if federal funding were to come through and if they can work out and develop into regular city employees, fine."

Yockey said that he expects to be advertising soon for residents to fill the positions.

Canton Township received \$25,497 from the newly-released funds and a similar allocation last summer.

According to Clerk John Flodin, the supplement, like the initial grant, will likely be used to add more firemen to the township force.

Flodin, like Yockey, would like to see an ordinance officer hired to enforce township ordinances, but the defeat Nov. 5 of the police and fire millage makes it probable that all the funds will go to pay firemen.

Canton Tax Bills Altered

When their tax bills come out Dec. 1, Canton residents will be required to pay a new one per cent collection fee, according to retiring Township Treasurer Grant Campbell.

The one per cent fee merely replaces an older charge previously built into tax bills by rounding off their decimal places, Campbell said. In legislation passed last year, townships were given the authority to levy collection fees in place of the traditional method of rounding off the taxes to the nearest higher figure.

In September the Canton Board of Trustees approved the levy of the one per cent fee. Residents of the Plymouth school district will pay 9.7 cents more in 1975 per \$1,000 of assessed property value. The amount will vary slightly in the Van Buren and Wayne-Westland districts.

WXYZ Talk Show Host Found Dead in Hines Park

The body of a new WXYZ Radio talk show host who had been living in Plymouth was found last week in a car on Hines Drive near Woods Drive in Plymouth Township.

Alan Douglas, 50, was found late Tuesday afternoon with his arms slashed. The county medical examiner has yet to rule on the official cause of death.

A WXYZ official said that Douglas had been hired Nov. 12 to host a nightly radio talk show. Monday, the day before his death, he did his first and only show.

Although he was a Detroit native, he became a broadcasting THE CONTRACTOR OF THE PARTY OF

personality in Cleveland and, more recently, on WNBC radio in New York.

WXYZ reported that following news of Douglas' death its switchboard was flooded with calls from New York and Cleveland.

Relatives reportedly told Sheriff's investigators that Douglas "had been despondent" recently and was worried about his career.

The body was discovered by Wayne County Road Commission workers. The name and address of Douglas' Plymouth relatives have been

withheld.



Jim McCartney is Optimistic

Despite the present economic slowdown, Jim McCartney, the new executive director of the Plymouth-Canton Development Commission and the Plymouth Chamber of Commerce, is taking a positive outlook towards his new job.

Although the official starting date was Oct. 1. McCartney began the job much earlier by talking at length with many

He-says what he found was a very positive attitude among townspeople - one of "let's get on with it." He points out that the recent vote on the Plymouth Loop Road was an example of this attitude. Although it might have been more encouraging to have had a 7-0 vote in favor of the Loop, the 4-3 vote still shows how the town wants to start moving ahead.

McCartney splits his time equally between the PCDC and the Plymouth Chamber of Commerce since the Chamber has been contracted by the PCDC to work for them.

Office secretary Gloria Wiski also divides her time between the two offices, both located in the building at 878 Wing St. Some might see a conflict of interest for McCartney, serving two organizations, both seeking new business development. But he says this is simply not the

As the man now responsible for attracting new business into the area, Jim McCartney brings valuable experience from two previous positions. His last job was with the Greater Detroit Chamber of Commerce where he served as Manager of the Economic Development Dept.

for tive years. Before that he was with the City of Westland as head of the Dept. of Economic Development.

As director of the PCDC he is again involved in industrial-commercial development activities in the Plymouth-Canton area. This entails giving "dollars and cents justification" why it's good for businesses to come here, besides actively seeking out new business development.

One area in which McCartney sees some room improvement is in committee function of the Plymouth Chamber of Commerce. From his observation, the Chamber Board has been doing all the work of the committees — coming up with new ideas for projects, passing upon them, then implementing them. According to McCartney the function of the Board is ideally only to give the go ahead or not to ideas brought before it by the committees, each made up of specialists in their particular area.

Right now, Jim McCartney seems anxious to "get on with it" himself. He and his secretary are in the process of setting up files so that the PCDC and the Plymouth Chamber have easier access to records of what's been happening and what's going to happen in the Plymouth-Canton area, whether it be industrial growth, retail sales projections, or what civic organizations and businesses now exist in the area. 

When questioned about it, Gornick said, "I'm not that anti-city, but at the time (of the consolidation election), yes, I


"At that time we were against consolidation, so we were using the arguments against it," he said, adding that it was up to the other side to explain cityhood's virtues.

Police Chief Offers Holiday Driving Tips

Christmas spirit is one thing, but, according to Chief of Police Tim Ford, "Christmas spirits" are something else again.

"To many people," the Chief reminded Plymouth area motorists, "having a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year means overdoing when it comes to the consumption of alcoholic beverages."

Chief Ford quoted National Safety Council statistics to emphasize the problem. At least half of all traffic fatalities last year in this country involved alcohol as a factor. Moreover, it's long been known that a vast majority of fatal holiday accidents are associated with drinking.

The Chief cited a few holiday party tips that have been endorsed by the International Association of Chiefs of Police:

- If you're the host, close down your bar earlier at least an hour before guests leave. Have plenty of food and coffee available as a "nightcap."
- If a guest has overindulged, have a less enthusiastic party goer take him home, or call a taxi. He may be resentful, but you'll be doing him a lifesaving favor.
- As either host or guest, remember that it takes your

body at least one hour per drink to eliminate the devastating effects of alcohol. Take time to dry out.

"The best advice," according to Chief Ford, "is still the common sense reminder, 'If you drink, don't drive.'!"

3 tbsp. flour 1/2 c. sugar

2 c. milk (scalded)

1 t. vanilla dash of salt

Mix flour, sugar, and salt. Beat eggs slightly and add scalded milk gradually. Cook over boiling water, stirring constantly until thickened and coats spoon. Remove from heat. Stir in vanilla. Cool at room temperature 30 minutes. Chill until served.

STEAMED (PLUM) PUDDING

1 c. flour 2 t. cinnamon 2 c. seeded raisins 1 c. chopped dates

1 t. cloves 1 t. baking soda

1/2 c. mixed citron ½ c. chopped walnuts

½ t. salt 2 eggs

1 t. vanilla 1 c. milk ¼ c. orange juice

1 c. brown sugar 1 c. ground suet

2 c. bread crumbs

Sift dry ingredients together. Beat eggs; add brown sugar, suet, bread crumbs, raisins, dates, citron, walnuts, vanilla. Mix well. Add dry ingredients, orange juice, and milk. Pour into greased bundt pan or 3 #3 tin cans. Steam in covered pan on trivet or rack in 1 c. water. Cook on high until steam escapes freely. Continue cooking on low 1% hours. Can be made ahead and refrigerated for several days. Resteam before serving. Serve with lots of custard sauce.



SHORTBREAD COOKIES

1 c. sugar

1 egg 1/2 lb. butter or oleo

1/2 lb. lard

Sufficient flour to roll out. Roll to "4" thick. Cut with cookie cutters. Bake on greased cookie sheet at 3750 until brown on edges (approximately 10 minutes).




After winning just two games last season in Canton's first year of varsity competition. Coach Casey Cavell is optimistic going into this season as all his players are returning.




