Flash fire rages in City

The raging flames of a "flash" fire resulted in the destruction of a garage at 502 N. Harvey Street at 11:58 a.m. Friday morning.

Plymouth Fire Chief Alan Matthews said that the fire started when one of the home's residents was cleaning auto parts in gasoline, while using a kerosene space heater in the garage.

Matthews said the gas fumes were ignited by the kerosene heater, creating. an explosion or flash fire.

While there were no serious injuries, the resident working in the garage received minor flash burns on the face, said Matthews.

Matthews also said the resident was able to save his car from damage by pushing it out of the garage and onto Farmer Street.

"We received the call at 11:58 and were on the scene at 11:59," said Matthews. "We had the fire under control in approximately 15 minutes."

The garage, which was attached to the home by a narrow breezeway, was completely destroyed, said Matthews.

"The fire spread quickly in the garage," Matthews said. "But, it didn't penetrate the brick (on the house) and the flames didn't spread into the house.'

Among the more drastic ideas under consideration by the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools Board of Education, following the defeat of a. two mills increase on March 22, is the closing of Lowell Middle School and the "mothballing" of the new Hoben Elementary School.

Saturday, the Board of Education looked at budget options, which call for reductions anywhere from \$1.1 million in operating expenses to as much as \$5 million.

Thursday, April 21 to finalize plans for the upcoming budget as well as consider another millage election. By that date district administrators hope to have concrete information on the effects of the Headlee Amendment.

Superintendent John M. Hoben said the district has only until April 26 to make a decision on whether to try. another millage election or not. The board will announce its plan at the April 25 regular meeting.

"From an administrative standpoint our priority is the classroom," Hoben told the board Saturday. "So we need to talk about priorities.

He added, "The irony of all this is that if we had gotten the two mills we'd still need a \$1 million in cuts."

"We have three or four weeks before we have to say 'this or that' needs to be cut," said Ray Hoedel, the district's associate superintendent for business.

"I think we owe it to the students of the community to give this (another election) one last shot," said Trustee Roland Thomas.

"I just don't think it's necessary to come right back," said Trustee Jeanette Wines. "We need to make some cuts and do some organizing."

"I'm really hesitant to put another millage back on the ballot in June,'

said Trustee Marilyn Schwinn. "I think the public told us what they wanted.7

Hoedel told the board that the district could expect as much as a three mills drop in funding because of the Headlee Amendment. Although revenues are up slightly (thanks somewhat to increased SEVS), expenditures are also on the rise.

"We have about six million in excess expenditures based on a rollback and the state aid picture," Hoedel said. "We might want to ask for another Headlee override in June but no additional millage."

The "maintenance level budget" projects \$53.5 million in revenues but \$59.5 million in expenditures, said Hoedel. State aid has fallen by more than \$2 million.

Among the many options being considered by the board:

Freeze all "discretionary"

spending in the district.

• Reduce staff. One figure mentioned was 62. That would at the same time probably increase classroom sizes.

• Close Lowell Middle School. The school is currently leased from the

Protests halt Haggerty Road paving

A special assessment to finance the paving of Haggerty Road between Joy and Koppernick roads in Canton was halted by protests from property owners at the Canton Board last week.

The project, which has been on the books since 1982-83, calls for straightening the jog in Haggerty Road and drainage improvements, as well as paving with a two-lane concrete top.

The special assessment would have provided over 1.5 million from the property owners whose lots front-on the stretch of Haggerty slated for improvement. Canton's Engineer Tom Casari estimated the total cost of the project would be approximately \$2

Property owner Jack Cook told the board, "I'm not opposed to sewers and paving, I just don't like the special assessment means of funding. This is an unusual stretch because Haggerty is being realigned, and plans call for a new railroad crossing. The property owners shouldn't have to pay for this. The Cherry Hill to Palmer stretch of Haggerty is being paid for with city, county and federal funds. Why not this section?"

Land Company of Michigan owner Gregory Donovan also addressed the board.

"We are looking for an equity situation," he said. "The township

should take into consideration who the beneficiaries of this paving will be." Donovan said he considers the project to be important, and is willing to donate four and one half acres to the project free of charge.

"Haggerty is an inter-community road, it works as freeway relief for people traveling between Plymouth and Canton. This is the only part of Haggerty from Palmer down not paved. We've been looking for this for some time," Donovan said.

Toys R Us representative Wasyl Hnatiw agreed with Cook and Donovan.

"The special assessment involves unfair representation," he said, adding that the county may need to get involved. Toys R Us will have a large warehouse on this section of Haggerty

Opposition by property owners rendered the special assessment invalid.

The Canton Board passed a motion that an outline for funding be drawn up which will draw upon city and county funds, as well as upon property owners. The Chessie System and the county will be approached to help finance the new railroad crossing.



Local Dems pick Dukakis

Democratic voters in all four Plymouth-Canton polling centers favored Massachusetts Gov. Michael Dukakias during Saturday's caucus vote.

The Rev. Jesse Jackson won the state Democratic vote, however, while retaining a close second place at all of the local voting spots.

Voters in the 2nd District, which includes Plymouth, Northville and Livonia, favored Jackson 6,598 to Dukakis' 4,957, but locally Dukakis tallied 258 votes to Jackson's 90.

Crier closed

The Community Crier/COMMA, offices will be closed this Friday (April 1) at noon so that staffers can partake in Good Friday worship. The offices will be open again for regular business on Monday, April 4 at 9 a.m.

Plymouth and Plymouth Township voters cast their ballot at the Plymouth Cultural Center.

Richard Gephardt garnered 82 votes in the Plymouth precinct, while Paul Simon collected 24 and Albert Gord Jr. had 17.

Voters in the 15th District, which includes Canton, cast 3,836 votes for Jackson and 3,168 for Dukakis. Locally, though, at all three Canton voting precincts, Dukakis came out on top.

At Canton High School, Dukakis collected 56 votes to Jackson's 43. Gephardt picked up 19. At The Winds polling center, Dukakis counted 75 votes, while Jackson had 52. Gephardt was a close third with 51 votes.

Dukakis also took the top spot at the UAW Local 735 polling center with 45 votes. Jackson picked up 31 and Gephardt had 28.

From four to six delegates were up for grabs in each of the two districts.

Water main to tie up Joy Road

The construction of a water main along Joy Road between Ann Arbor and Sheldon roads will begin this spring and, as a result, area travellers can expect minor inconveniences.

The three-phase construction plan is scheduled to begin April 18 and could greatly affect residents along Mc-Clumpha, Sheldon Center, and Canton Center roads, according to Township Police Chief Carl Berry.

Berry estimated that four to 5,000 cars will travel daily on McClumpha Road as a result of the construction.

"The McClumpha and Ann Arbor roads intersection could be a serious concern," said Berry.

On April 18 the portion of Joy Road from Sheldon to Canton Center roads will be closed except for one lane of local traffic. Portions of Joy Road will be re-opened as the construction moves west.

According to Berry, a significant impact will be felt at the high schools.

At a Monday meeting of school officials, ideas to circumvent the problem were discussed. Plans to close the east side student parking lot at Salem High School or to construct a temporary road may through the Centennial Education Park and reroute travellers onto Canton Center Road were considered, said Berry.

While Berry expressed concerns with the maintenance of McClumpha Road during the period of construction, plans for paving the road from Joy to Beck roads are in the future.

According to Township Supervisor Maurice Breen, developers along McClumpha Road plan to pave the road south of Ann Arbor Road. Paving plans, though, are still undetermined.

"The problem is working it into a paving schedule with the county," said Breen.

Township officials expect the Joy Road construction to be completed by early fall.





P-C police consider mutual aid plans

The three police departments in The Plymouth-Canton Community are currently reviewing two plans which would establish formal procedures for mutual police aid and assistance to cover emergency situations within western Wayne County.

The two plans currently under

review are Annex H, which strictly covers law enforcement responsibilities and is part of the overall Wayne County Emergency Plan, and the Western Wayne County Mutual Aid (WWCMA) program, which is a localized plan for mutual police aid between the sixteen western Wayne County police departments.

While both set up guidelines for cooperative police response in western Wayne County, Annex H is a county developed plan which is only one part of a much larger mutual aid program, which includes the deployment of rescue vehicles, fire equipment, public works, volunteers, etc.

The control of the co

"Annex H is part of an overall Wayne County plan," said Plymouth Township Police Chief Carl Berry. "It fits into an overall program to cover disasters like flight 255."

Canton's Public Safety Director John Santomauro described WWCMA police task force program as the formalization of "unwritten" policy of mutual police aid already in place in the area. He pointed to the multicommunity police response during the recent disturbance at Salem and Canton high schools as an example.

Cooperation with the programs is still being discussed by area police departments. To date, neither the Canton Board of Trustees, the Plymouth City Commission, nor the Plymouth Township Board of Trustees have given their formal approval of either plan.

"We want to have a coordinated system, so that there won't be an unnecessary response of police officers," said Plymouth Police Chief Richard Myers.

Twp. denies renewal for Plymouthrock

In round two of the battle between the Plymouthrock Saloon and Plymouth Township, township trustees voted last Tuesday to deny the renewal of the saloon/restaurant's Class C Liquor License.

On Feb. 24, the board of trustees voted to recommend that the Rock's liquor license be revoked by the Michigan Liquor Control Commission (LCC) based on supposed nuisances created by the establishment and its alleged sale of alcohol to minors.

Plymouthrock attorney Norman

Farhat questioned the importance of last Tuesday's decision, citing that the recommended revocation is more severe than the non-renewal.

"It's rather innocuos," said Farhat.
"What furhter action could be taken?
The LCC won't reject your recommendation."

No hearing date has yet been set for an LCC hearing.

In an earlier interview with the Crier, Plymouthrock manager and shareholder Pete Elefterio said that the revocation would be appealed in court.

Alternative Education report suggests expansion

In the final report of the Alternative Education Task Force issued last week to the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools Board of Education, there is a suggestion to expand the programs to the elementary, school level.

The task force also recommended continuing existing programs at the middle school and high school level. The group also suggested that the district begin an "in-house" program to reach students who have difficulty functioning in the traditional school setting.

Perspective honored

The CEP Perspective, the student newspaper at Centennial Educational Park, recently received several awards for its 1986-87 publication year.

The paper was named a Crown Award Nominee for the Columbia Scholastic Press Association's (CSPA) National High School Journalism Contest. The Perspective attained All-Columbian status in the areas of coverage, design with hands-on production, and writing and editing.

The newspaper earned 956 points out of a possible 1,000 in the competition.

Reporters from the Perspective also won first place in the 1987 Editorial Leadership Awards, sponsored by the Associated Collegiate Press (ACP), the National Scholastic Press Association (NSPA) and the Los Angeles Times. "The task force found that the programs we already have are excellent," said Kent Buikema, chairman of the committee and director of secondary education in the school district. "Our feeling is that they should be continued as is, but that wasn't one of the options given us."

Currently, the district also funds the Learning Options program through Growth Works, Inc., a non-profit organization in Plymouth which helps troubled youths.

There was some suggestion last week that the district pull out of the Growth Works program and begin its own 'inhouse' effort at the high schools.

"We'd be starting from scratch if we did that," Buikema said. "There'd be some gains and loses."

One of the disadvantages, said Buikema, would be the reduced number of students the district could help, at first anyway.

The Growth Works program reaches nearly 90 youths a year. A new school program might reach only 40 students a year, said Buikema.

"We've got to look at what we can do if we're forced to do it with very little resources," said Board Trustee Lester Walker.

"We've got some tough decisions to look at," said Board President David Artley. "The bottom line is that we should be able to deliver this service."

Artley said the board would consider what to do with the Alternative Education program in the school district when it looks at next year's budget during the coming weeks.



At Haggerty and Joy there is concern, though, by some of the businesses which front what is currently a dirt road. They are not so sure the cost -- which will come mostly from their pockets -- is worth it.

Whether the funds come from government or private pockets, eliminating the jogs at both intersections should go forward at top speed.

Once realigned the intersectons could become magnets for new business. That's a plus, of course, as is making the community's roadways

Who is planning to run for what in P-C?

It's that time... elections are at hand. Who's running for what?

Some of this is speculation — some of it is hot news (like Tom Yack deciding Monday night to take out petitions for Canton supervisor). None of it is etched in stone until the filing deadline of 4 p.m. Tuesday, May 31... or maybe not until the withdrawal deadline three days later.

First, the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools board race with 17 persons taking out petitions so far. (One has said he's decided not to run, two—Richard Sumpter and Leon Watkins—have been certified.) The major election focus, though, will be on the partisan offices at the

Plymouth Township Supervisor Maurie Breen will undoubtedly face opposition this time (unlike four years ago). Either Jerry Raymor and-or Jim Irvine will challenge him. OLGC parking affects all City property owners

It should especially concern the Plymouth business community that profits from visitors to Plymouth who shop here because Plymouth is not another Eastland, Westland, Northland, or 12 Oaks shopping mall.

With five churches in the immediate vicinity of the city center surrounded by or bordering on prime residential areas, the city commision should address the prospective growth needs of these churches head-on and with candor, It should not let developments take place unchecked over which it will have no control later on.

The question should be asked whether accommodating the needs of large numbers of parishioners from outside Plymouth is compatible with the city's obligation to its tax-paying residents.

The prospect of additional blacktop or concrete parking space defacing residential areas around OLGC, St. Peter's, First Presbyterian, Central Baptist, and First Church of Christian Science is horrible, but unfortunately no longer a futuristic fantasy. When these churches were founded and built in Pymouth, their viability was based on the population of Plymouth and the space available.

Since then housing and population around Plymouth have exploded while the space available within city limits of Plymouth has remained the same.

The churches, in this case Our Lady of Good Counsel, should acknowledge these changed realities rather than insist on their rights to grow on the basis of outdated zoning laws and codes. Their needs for growth may be better served outside Plymouth where

the present and anticipated increase in parishioners really occurs, where land is available and encroachment upon residential areas less likely.

Other alternatives to more blacktop in Plymouth have been suggested: the use of the centrally located city parking structure (in walking distance of all the churches mentioned above), the neighboring streets, more masses and services on Sundays etc.

Our Land of Good Counsel was illadvised to camouflage its identity while purchasing 179 Arthur for undetermined future use. Neighbors reacted with disbelief and outrage. It is easy to imagine the amount of uncertainty and suspicion created in the community when "for sale" signs are put up on properties in the vicinity of churches. Has my neighbor given up the fight ot simply been brought out by a church? Will another "European"

corporation" be the buyer who later on turns out to be your friendly neighborhood church?

Since the city of Plymouth cannot stop churches from buying property, it should find ways to stop them from turning this property into parking lots. Responsible city planning involves conservation of the treasures you have.

Our tree-lined streets with well-maintained old homes are a vital contribution to the city's identity and the well-being of all citizens. If a city commission can rezone residential property to accommodate commercial growth, it should find ways to stop churches from destroying the city's residential areas.

I cannot see any reason why the city of Plymouth should commit urban suicide simply because one big, non-taxpaying resident wants to grow.

Just when a real budget crunch seems on the horizon more bad news is flowing from the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools district.

This time it is in the nature of new federal regulations on friable and nonfriable asbestos.

The district faces an additional cost of \$120,000 to inspect all of its. buildings for friable asbestos this year.

Superintendent John M. Hoben said the district's program needs to identify a coordinator, inform the staff, qualify an inspector, begin building inspections (by October this year), formulate a management plan and have that plan in place by 1989.

The district will also have to begin removing friable asbestos this year.

The federal regulation calls for it to be removed by October.

"They recommend we buy the moon suits and other equipment," said Hoben.

The district is looking at a cost of about six cents per square foot just to inspect each building.

'We think it's rather extreme," said Hoben, who added that the inspections would have to be far more thorough than ever before. "They're telling all school districts to go back and inspect again even if they have already.'

Hoben added there was some legislation in the U.S. Senate which would give districts more time to comply with the new regulations.

Joint Resolution K is the current vehicle bill for state school funding. It could reduce property taxes by \$1.5 billion, according to Hoben.

The state would collect two cents more in state sales tax, while property taxes would be reduced by reducing the percentage of valuation assessed against a home or business.

Currently, all state equalized valuations (SEVs) are at 50 per cent of the real value of a home or business Under the bill, property would be assessed at only 25 per cent of its real value (35 per cent for businesses).

Hoben said the bill has bi-partisan support, but that a public refrerendum on the sales tax must first be passed. (possibly on the August primary vote).

Classes at Centennial Educational Park (CEP) may be disrupted this spring by the consturction on a new in alone lov Road

Hoben said construction could limit entrance and egress for both student drivers and school buses.

Hoben said he has talked to a district attorney about a possible restraining order, which would back the work up from an April start to a June start.

"We have some serious concerns about safety as well as entrance and egress to the grounds," Hoben said.

Students survey: clean Rouge, but who pays?

We are eighth grade students at Central Middle School and have done a survey on the pollution of the Rouge River for a school science project. Since this subject concerns a great increased to clean the river and the amount of the population in the Setroit area we would like you to publish the results of our survey in an issue of your

We conducted our survey during two weekends in February asking people leaving Plymouth-Canton stores to answer five questions. We received 50

Of the 50 people we surveyed, 100 per cent acknowledge that they would rather clean the Rouge River than find alternative water supplies. However, ADAM GOLOVOY only 10 per cent of the people we surveyed said that they have helped CENTRAL MIDDLE cleaned the Rouge River, and more SCHOOL STUDENTS

than 60 per cent said they would not help clean the river. In answer to our question about increasing taxes to provide money to clean the river, 50 per cent said yes they would want taxes other 50 per cent said they would not. Finally 15 per cent of the people said that they think they contribute to water pollution in the Rouge River, while the other 85 per cent said that they did not increase pollution in the river.

The results of our survey indicate that people want to have the river cleaned, but do not want to help clean it up or pay money to have someone else clean the river.

Over creek, motor mall

Canton residents raise concerns

Canton residents expressed concern over the flooding of Willow Ceek and the building of a new motor mall at last week's meeting of the Canton Board of Trustees.

Representatives of the Pickwick Homeowners Association said they were both angered and concerned over repeated flooding of the creek. "Our requests to have the creek cleaned up have been ignored. I want to know what the board is going to do about it (flooding)? homeowner Robert Cieslak asked.

Canton Supervisor James Poole repsonded that the only avenue open to the township at this point is to restrict building along the creek. "We tried a special assessment to widen the creek on the south side, but it failed," he said.

Chief Building Official Aaron Machnik said that the creek had been cleaned five years ago as a part of routine maintenance. He added, "The creek is doing what it is supposed to do. It's hard to get permission to clean the creek from people who have landscaped their lawns with shrubs and trees."

Resident Polly Peppler expressed concern over the problems caused by the removal of trees and shrubbery from the creek banks. "The trees are gone, and there is nothing to stop the water," she said.

Both Peppler and Cieslak were frustraed over continued building along the creek. Cieslak asked if zoning ordinances could force builders to place homes further from the creek.

"We can't stop them from building," Poole said.

"We are limited in how far we can go with zoning," said Trustee Robert Padget. "We have to be reasonable."

Peppler also voiced concern about the proposed building of the Canton Motor Mall on Ford Road between Lilley and Haggerty roads.

"It's going to be right across the creek from me," she said.

Architect Stanley Tkacz, who represented Canton Motor Mall at the meeting, outlined plans for the mall's major dealership to the board. Site plans for additional dealerships will be submitted later, Tkacz said.

Tkacz also told the board that the owners of the proposed mall are willing to landscape in order to make the property less offensive to residents.

Director of Canton Community and Economic Development, Dave Nicholson, said that earlier plans called for a six-foot berm to be built across

the back of the property and the construction of a retention pond. In addition, the south side of Willow Creek will be widened. The motor mall owners have obtained permits from the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) for the plan.

Canton's Engineering Department has recommended the plans be altered so that the retention pond is elongated across the back of the lot and land-scaping is employed to make the property more attractive. The berm will be eliminated, subject to approval from the Zoning Board of Appeals and further permission must be obtained from the DNR.

The trustees approved the new site plan, with the understanding that a sound and sight shield of trees and plants will be erected across the back of the property.

Fisher found guilty

Charles Fisher was found guilty of first-degree murder recently in the 1984 slaving of his wife Ella Maria Mercado Fisher, 30.

Fisher was charged with staging a burglary attack in the couple's Thornwood home in Canton in July of 1984. He said his wife was bound in rope and her face wrapped in duct tape.


The prosecution maintained that Fisher planned the attack and then carried it out.

Fisher is scheduled to be sentenced for the crime, which carries a maximum term of life imprisonment, today (March 30) in Wayne County Circuit Court.

There are more than 200 NA meetings in southeast Michigan. They are open to both men and women, boys nd girls, of all ages. So far atte at the Plymouth meeting has hovered between 15-20 people.

"I can't say enough about NA," said another member and lifelong resident of Plymouth."It's changed my life drastically and for the better."

David, who says he is an addict "just like the others" in NA, wants

newcomers to feel welcome at the meeting.

"We think newcomers to the meetings can be helped by dealing directly with other addicts, " he said.

Most members of NA, a nation-wide organization which began in 1973, use what is known as a "surrender chip" to help them "surrender" to the group's principles and stay off of

"Our only goal is to stay clean today. Today is all we have," David said. "We share experiences and try and help each other."

NA is a self supporting group. It raises money at meetings or through fundraisers. The group meets in a variety of places, from churches and schools to halls or government buildings.

The Plymouth group meets at Growth Works, Inc., on Main Street. NA also sponsors a 24-hour helpline. Locally, it is 543-7200. The line is

manned by recovering addicts as well. One NA member really got-the ball rolling in Plymouth by approaching Growth Works with the idea of setting

up a regular meeting there. "I've gotten so much from NA, I just wanted to give something back,"


Something else may add to the Rocks' speed as well as to Canton's speed.

Canton team wins Science Olympiad

Middle school and high school students from the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools turned in outstanding performances at the Wayne County Regional Science Olympiad competition on Saturday, March 19 at the University if Detroit.

Thirty-nine schools from Wayne County competed, each with a team of 15 students, 18 different science events such as Astronomy, Chemistry Lab, Computer Programming, Metric Estimation, Mousetrap Vehicles, Laser Shoot, and Tree Identifications
